ANNOUNCEMENTS AND INSPIRATION

34th Sunday in Ordinary Time – or Solemnity of Christ the King

In just a few days ago, we American people will celebrate that all too famous holiday that brings family and friends together – Thanksgiving. This feast centers around a bountiful array of foods, deserts and drinks. Relatives join together from great distances to give thanks. I am reminded of the old song – "Over the River and thru the woods, to Grandmother's house we go." And as we go, wherever we go, we extend greetings to one another with words, but more by showing up and partaking in the shared food at table. All of this is, hopefully, reminders that we have a home, a family where there is love and forgiveness, friends who act as an extended family, and of course – a wonderful meal. And for all of this we give thanks. But not just on this day do we give thanks, but should every waking moment of our lives.

In a sense, it is a ritual because we usually eat the same traditional foods – turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, yams, homemade pasta, cranberry sauce, etc.; we celebrate with the same relatives and friends, all trying to say thanks to each other for mainly being a part of that circle of friendship.

As we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King this weekend, we also have ritual – where there is the same Food, the Body and Blood of Christ; we gather with the same people of our Parish; we hear the same stories from Scripture of how Christ is unlike any earthly king. His Kingship is one of service to others rather than the other way around. As we gather at this meal, we can reflect on ways that God has worked to bring us to a fuller sense of creation, our creation. We can reach out and touch the little and large creations around us which support our life's experience.

In reality the Eucharist is a Thanksgiving celebration. The word – Eucharist - comes from the Greek and translates into "Thanksgiving." And so, every time we come to Mass, we should prepare for it much as we prepare for the Thanksgiving meal that we participate in. After preparation for Mass, we should reflect on all that God does for us, give Him thanks, and then open ourselves up to His graces so that we can extend those gifts to others around us. In doing this, we are following the example of Jesus Who came to serve, not be served.

The Gospel selection for this Feast centers our attention and prayer upon God's love and care for us. Jesus calls us to share that love with those around us, especially those most in need of love. This is when our Faith and Baptism are most obvious – when the love we received from God is shared with others in so many countless ways (think of Paul's description of love: Love is patient, love is kind, love is not jealous, . . . love forgives). So many ways that we can share God's love with those around us, and we can add to Paul' list – by encouraging others, by being present to those who are alone, by taking time to listen to someone who needs to talk, and so on.

Jesus does not mince words when He speaks to His disciples. He tells them in no uncertain terms that when they give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the ill, visit the prisoner they are doing these things for Him.

I once read the following that ties in with today's lesson. Imagine the Tabernacle in a Catholic Church. Whenever we enter the sacred space of a Catholic Church we reverence Christ's real presence in the tabernacle. As we receive the body and blood of Christ in the Eucharist, we become a living tabernacle for Christ's presence within ourselves. And as we go about our daily activities, we should work to see each and every person we encounter as a living, breathing tabernacle standing before us. We should see it as our responsibility and call as a follower of Christ to reverence that presence of the Divine in each and every person.

As a global Church community we have come to the end of another Liturgical year. Today's Solemnity of Christ the King invites us to take stock of how we have been loved and how we have shown love in the past year. God's love for His people is powerful. One of the greatest ways that we can show our Thanks to God for all that He does for us is by following the example of Jesus – sharing the Father's love with one another. Let's not stop the power of that love, but instead be willing to

live it every day of our lives in the way we welcome & treat others. In this way we will be living Thanksgiving every day of our lives.

Let us Pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace

Diocese of Greensburg plans televised Christmas Masses

With concerns over a resurgence in coronavirus cases, particularly in the four counties of the Diocese of Greensburg, diocesan leaders have decided to televise Christmas Masses to engage the faithful at home. A Christmas Vigil Mass from Blessed Sacrament Cathedral in Greensburg celebrated by the Cathedral Rector, Monsignor Raymond E. Riffle, will be broadcast at 2 p.m. on Christmas Eve. Diocesan Administrator, Monsignor Larry J. Kulick, will celebrate a Mass from Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, which will be broadcast at 10 a.m. on Christmas Day. Both Masses will air on PCNC, the Pittsburgh Cable News Channel.

Important message - Confession

As we enter into the Season of Advent and prepare to celebrate the coming of Jesus in the flesh in His birth, many things will be different from what we are used to. This year during the Advent Season, and due to health and safety concerns, there will not be any Communal Penance Services. This does not mean that the opportunity for the Sacrament of Reconciliation will not be available. We will continue to celebrate the Sacrament on Saturdays before the Vigil Mass. In addition, the Diocese of Greensburg has named the week of December 14 as a Week of Grace. During that week additional opportunities to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available.

At *Church of St Anne*, in addition to Confessions on Saturday at 3:30 PM, we will have Confessions on Monday (Dec 14) and Thursday (Dec 17) $-\frac{1}{2}$ hour before the 8:00 AM Mass, and $\frac{1}{2}$ hour after the morning Mass. The Sacrament will also be available at Church of St Anne on Tuesday, December 15 at 7:00 PM - 8:00 PM. Confessions take place in the Cry Room area.

At *Holy Family Parish*, in addition to Confessions on Saturday at 3:00 PM, we will have Confessions on Tuesday (Dec 15) and Wednesday (Dec 16) – ½ hour before the 8:00 AM Mass, and ½ hour after the morning Mass. The Sacrament will also be available at Holy Family on Wednesday, December 16 at 7:00 PM – 8:00 PM. Confessions take place at the front of the Church – the room to the left of the Sanctuary.

At Church of St John the Baptist, in addition to Confessions on Saturday at 4:00 PM, we will have Confessions on Mon (Dec 14) thru Thurs (Dec 17) – ½ hour before the 9:00 AM Mass, and ½ hour following the morning Mass. The Sacrament will also be available at Church of St John the Baptist on Thursday, December 17 at 7:00 PM – 8:00 PM. Confessions take place in the Cry Room area.

Clearance Requirements Must Be Met

Beginning this year, the policy for Virtus, Protecting God's Children has changed. We are now required to do a Recertification Course every five years. This course is a brief refresher and may be completed online by accessing it on the Diocese of Greensburg website. For those who prefer it, we are offering a live class here at Holy Family parish on Sunday, November 22nd following the 11:00 am Mass. If you completed your original class in 2015 or earlier, you are required to complete this course. Those who wish to participate in this course, please contact Lauretta Stanley at 724-872-3486.

As a reminder, other clearance requirements have a 5-year expiration as well. These include the Criminal Background Check, the Child Abuse Clearance, and the Affidavit. If you have not renewed these documents since 2015, you must update them or you will not be able to continue in your parish ministries. This is the law in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the policy of the Diocese of Greensburg.
