WORSHIP TOGETHER

4th Sunday in Ordinary Time – The common theme of today's readings is Divine authority, as exercised in this world by the prophets of the Old Testament in their messages, by the apostles (including St. Paul), in their writings and teaching in the New Testament, and by Jesus in his teaching and healing ministry.

Today's first reading from the Old Testament Book of Deuteronomy tells us that a true prophet like Moses speaks with authority because it is God Who speaks through him. After the Babylonian exile, the Jewish priests began to interpret the words of Moses given in the first reading, namely, "a prophet like me," as referring to one individual, the expected Messiah. This passage is chosen for today's first reading because it refers to Jesus, the "preacher with authority," mentioned in today's Gospel.

The response for today's Responsorial Psalm, (Ps 95), speaks of not hardening our hearts when we hear God's authoritative voice through the Scripture and the Church's teaching authority. In Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul exercises his God-given authority as the *Apostle to the Gentiles* to teach people in Corinth that marriage is a holy state ordained by God and that it is a life-long partnership according to the teaching of the Lord. But he opts for, and recommends, celibacy, so that one may serve the Lord without the distractions of married life.

In today's Gospel selection, Mark describes one sample Sabbath day of Jesus' public life. Jesus joins in public worship in the synagogue as a practicing Jew, heals the sick, drives out evil spirits and prays privately. People immediately noticed that Jesus teaches with authority and heals with Divine power. Jesus explains the Scriptures with complete confidence, and when questioned by people, he answered with authority. Jesus is using His real (authentic) Divine authority to teach, empower, liberate, and heal others. In today's Gospel, the evil spirit recognized and loudly declared Jesus as the Messiah. Jesus harsh, command, "Be quiet! Come out of him!" exorcises the demon who departs, obedient to Jesus' Divine authority.

Jesus did not use His authority and Divine power to rule and control people, but to set them free. Similarly, let us approach Jesus with trusting Faith so that He may free us from the evil spirits that keep us from praying and that prevent us from loving others and sharing our blessings with them. Jesus also frees us from all the "evil spirits" of fear, jealousy, anger, envy, addictions, compulsions, selfishness, resentment, and hostility. May God free us from all those spirits which make us deaf, dumb, blind, lame, and paralyzed, physically and spiritually.

So many people with authority have made a lasting impression on our lives either for good or ill. Perhaps it was a grandparent, an uncle, or a parent, who loved us and cared for us. Perhaps it was a Sunday school teacher who encouraged us in our Faith and exerted a positive impact on our lives. Perhaps we remember the kindness as well as the firm discipline that a schoolteacher gave us. Teachers are powerful because they change and mold lives. Let us all become good teachers like Jesus and use our authority to mold young lives in the right way.

Saints for this week -

February 2 –Forty Days after His birth, Jesus was presented in the temple by Mary and Joseph to fulfill Jewish law. There He was recognized by Simeon and Anna, who were waiting for the coming Mesisah.

Blessing of Homes – a Catholic Tradition around the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus Once blessed, a blessing does not disappear over time. When rosaries, or a crucifix, or a statue is blessed – that blessing remains with the object. So also with our homes. If, however, you feel the need to "re-bless" your homes, the following prayer can be used.

When Christ took flesh through the Blessed Virgin Mary, He made His home with us. Let us now pray that He will enter this home and bless it with His presence. May He always be here among us; may He nurture our love for each other, share in our joys, comfort us in our sorrows. Inspired by His teachings and example, let us seek to make our home before all else a dwelling place of love, diffusing far and wide the goodness of Christ.

Lord, be close to Your servants who move into this home (today)/(or - who live in this home) and ask for Your blessing. Be their shelter when they are at home, their companion when they are away, and their welcome guest when they return. And at last receive them into the dwelling place You have prepared for them in Your Father's house, where You live for ever and ever. AMEN. And then, and usually at the main entrance, you may inscribe over the door with chalk -20 C + M + B 21.

(The 20 and the 21 signify the year of the blessing. The initials C + M + B represent the names of the 3 Magi who visited the infant Jesus – Caspar, Melchior, Balthasar).

February 3 – **St Blase** – According to tradition, Blasé retreated to a cave and became a hermit during the persecution of Licinius. While there, he befriended wild animals and cared for them when wounded or sick. One day, hunters found Blase in the woods surrounded by wild animals. They captured him with the intention of putting him in prison. On the way to Sebaste, Blasé encountered a woman whose little boy was choking to death on a fishbone. Blasé healed him and the blessing of throats on this day derives from that story.

Blessing of Throats – because of COVID.....The traditional Blessing of Throats, commemorating the Feast of St Blase, will take place at this weekend's Masses as part of the Final Blessing of the Mass. Rather than individual throat blessings, the Final Blessing will incorporate the words of the St Blase blessing.

Modifications made for Ash Wednesday

Providing for the safety and welfare of the faithful has necessitated many modifications to our ritual practices. To reduce the risk of transmitting the coronavirus, it is not permitted this year to sign the faithful with ashes in the customary fashion.

Rather, on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 17), the tradition of being marked with ashes will take place in a different fashion, through a sprinkling with ashes.

The minister, using a thumb and index finger, secures a pinch of ashes from the vessel containing the ashes. Without using words, the minister then sprinkles the ashes on the heads of the recipients. Please remember that the reception of ashes on Ash Wednesday is not required. Whether participating in this ritual or not, all the faithful are urged to undertake penitential practices during these Lenten days
