

### Saints for this week

# September 23 - St Pio of Pietrelcina (also known as Padre Pio) (1887-1968)

He was born in the small village of Pietrelcina in southern Italy, and joined the Capuchin friars at the age of 16. He became a priest seven years later, and spent fifty years at the monastery of San Giovanni Rotondo, where he was very much sought after as a spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor. On September 29, 1918, while kneeling in front of a large crucifix, he received the visible marks of the crucifixion, making him the first stigmatized priest in the history of the Church. The doctor who examined Padre Pio could not find any natural cause for the wounds. Upon his death in 1968, the wounds were no longer visible. In fact, there was no scarring and the skin was completely renewed. He had predicted 50 years prior that upon his death the wounds would heal.

The blood from the stigmata had a fragrance described by many as similar to that of perfume or flowers, and the gift of bilocation was attributed to him. Padre Pio had the ability to read the hearts of the penitents who flocked to him for confession which he heard for ten or twelve hours per day. Padre Pio used the confessional to bring both sinners and devout souls closer to God; he would know just the right word of counsel or encouragement that was needed.

Padre Pio died on September 23, 1968 at the age of eighty-one. His funeral was attended by about 100,000 people. On June 16, 2002, over 500,000 pilgrims gathered in Rome to witness Pope John Paul II proclaim padre Pio as Saint Pio of Pietrelcina.



## **WORSHIP TOGETHER**

# 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

## (Amos 8: 4-7; I Timothy 2: 1-8; Luke 16: 1-13)

The oppression of poor people by the well-off, comfortable people is condemned by the prophet Amos in today's first reading. In his first letter to Timothy, Paul reminds Timothy today that the good Lord wants everyone to be saved, not just some; not just the rich, not just the comfortable, or the respectable – but everyone, including the poor, the criminal, the down-and-out, the despairing. Therefore, no matter what happens, we cannot bring the gavel of condemnation down on the people we do not like, or on the people who give us trouble. Our greatest sin, the practice that does most harm to our society, is the practice of excluding certain groups of people because they don't "meet our criteria."

In the Gospel, Our Lord is teaching something that is extremely complex – a parable about the master and the steward. The words are there on the page: "So I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when the money fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of because He goes on to say that you have to choose to be the servant either of God or of money. Nor would Jesus be happy to see us forsaking our innocence for the sake of an easier conclusion to life's challenges. His own life provides us with a clear framework of the courage and honesty He asks of us, whatever the trials we must endure. So – what are the skills a follower of Jesus needs that display the same ability or astuteness in matters of the Gospel. The main quality that Jesus highlights, something the unjust steward is certainly not an example of, is trustworthiness. He also asks for freedom from greed and from a devotion to riches and money, again the opposite of the unjust steward.

After a brief exchange with the Pharisees, who laugh at Him for this attitude to money, Jesus will go on to tell the parable of the rich man who ignores the poor man, Lazarus, at his gate. Ultimately, Jesus uses the example of the steward to turn upside down the world and call us to defend, with the same energy and passion, His new option for those who are poor. This is where we may get confused. We are not to be taken in by the world of the steward. Rather – we are to use all our wit and wisdom to promote the values of the Gospel and the recognition of those who are vulnerable and weak in the eyes of that world.

It is in the making of friends with everyone – even those most ignored by the rest of society – that seals our lives in harmony. Never set out to make enemies of anyone. The bonds of good will must be forged between all groups in society, especially where injustice and inequality threaten to destroy the peace. Having a care for the poor, not driving them into despair, this is the Lord's clear teaching today.

Matthew - The call of

St. Matthew, the tax collector, to be one of the twelve apostles of Jesus is described in the Gospel which bears his name. "Jesus saw a man named Matthew at his post where taxes were collected. He said to him, "Follow Me!" And Matthew got up and followed Him." It is hard to imagine a more unlikely person for Jesus to call as a companion than Matthew. Tax collectors, as agents of a hated Roman government and members of a profession known for unfairness and greed, were despised by the Jewish people. They were excluded from the synagogue and the temple. No good Jew would have anything to do with them. When Jesus invited Matthew to follow Him and then ate at his house where Matthew's friends, outsiders like himself, were gathered, he heard the outraged comments of Capernaum's local leaders. "Why does Je [Jesus] eat with tax collectors and sinners?" Jesus simply replied, "Those who are well have no need of a doctor; sick people do." By calling Matthew, Jesus invited an outcast to enjoy the healing friendship of God. In a lesson of love, Jesus showed that God wants all, no matter who they are, to share His life


