

Saints for this week

September 26 - Sts. Cosmas and Damian - According to tradition, Cosmas and Damian were twin brothers born in Arabia. They were doctors, but did not accept money for their services, thus becoming known as "the holy moneyless ones." They were arrested during the persecution of Christians under Emperor Diocletian, tortured and beheaded in the year 303.

September 27 - St Vincent de Paul, born in France on April 24, 1581. His family were French peasants and lived on a farm. Vincent is best known for founding the Congregation of the Mission, or the Vincentians as they are commonly known, to preach the Gospel to the poor and work for the education of the clergy. With St Louise de Marillac, he established the Sisters of Charity in 1633 to care for the sick, the orphaned, and the aged.

September 29—Feast of the Archangels, Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael—Holy Scripture speaks of angels as ministers of God in human affairs. St Michael defends the honor of God against Satan. St Gabriel announced to Mary the coming of Jesus, St Raphael guided Tobias on his journey and brought healing to Tobit, his blind father. As servants of God, the angels are instruments of God's hidden providence. They preserve us from harm, give God's wisdom and strength to humanity, and accompany us on our journey through life.

Sept 25 - 27, 2022 - Our Jewish brothers and sisters celebrate Rosh HaShanah, their Jewish New Year, this week. The biblical name for this holiday is Yom Teruah, literally "day of shouting or blasting." It is the first of the Jewish High Holy Days, as specified by Leviticus 23:23–25, that occur in the late summer/early autumn of the Northern Hemisphere.

<u>Saturday - October 1, 2022</u> - In honor of St Francis of Assisi (whose feast is celebrated on October 4), the annual Blessing of Pets will take place in the St Anne parking lot beginning at 12:30 PM

October 2 - Feast of the Guardian Angels - If October 2 was not on a Sunday, this year, the Church would be honoring the Guardian Angels. Both the Old and the New Testament recognize that God gives each person born into this world an angel guardian. Jesus, calling a little child to Him, said that the angels in Heaven watch over children such as this one. By a loving providence God reaches into human life to guard, protect and lead us on our way to salvation.

WORSHIP TOGETHER

26th Sunday in Ordinary Time -

(Amos 6: 1,4-7; I Timothy 1: 6:11-16; Luke 16:19-31)

I read the following in a book entitled "more holy humor."

A fellow quit going fishing on Sunday and began going to church. The preacher, grateful to see him, said: "Henry, it makes me feel good to see you and your wife here every Sunday." "Well," said the fisherman, "I figured I'd rather hear your sermon than hers."

The people of Amos' day had been hearing a lot of Amos' preaching on their misuse of their wealth. Over the past few weeks, as well as for this weekend, we also have been privileged to hear from the Prophet. Amos does not denounce wealth itself, but rather the complacency that often accompanies it. He is distressed because the affluent of his day entertain themselves with wantonness while the social structure of the northern kingdom of Israel disintegrates. He censures the habit of self-indulgence at feasts. The wealthy dine on the meat of lambs and calves, the very animals that were used for sacrifice. Their fastidious tastes expose their arrogance. Perhaps the most excessive example of dissolute dining is their manner of drinking wine. Not content to sip from goblets, they guzzle from wide-mouthed bowls. One can only imagine the result of such drinking. The angry prophet prophecies that those rich and unsympathetic people in the Southern kingdom of Judah will be punished by God with exile because they don't care for their poor and suffering brothers in the North.

In this weekend's Gospel selection, Jesus warns us by pointing to the destiny of the rich man who neglected his duty to show mercy to poor Lazarus. The rich man's punishment was not for having riches, but for neglecting the Scriptures and what they taught.

Being complacent means showing smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements. The prophet Amos paints a vivid picture of a pampered people, lying on couches, snacking and sipping to soothing music, massaged into a state of lethargy. Then he lowers the boom: "Party's over. Get ready for exile."

Jesus also paints a portrait of ongoing laziness and lack of care for others. Rich Man lies on his couch, dressed in luxuriant purple and soft linen, eating rich foods and drinking choice wines "each day." The problem, again, is that he has become so anesthetized that he can't move, not even to go out to the gate where poor Lazarus lies, smelly, starving, and sickly. Then, suddenly, death pulls down the curtain. So what was the sin of the rich man? He did not kick Lazarus. He was not cruel to him. The sin of the rich man was that **he never noticed** Lazarus as a human being and a brother, an who represents a fact of life: the poor, the sick, and the unfortunate who are always around us. He did no wrong, but he did nothing good, either. The problem that rich Dives encountered was that he seemed oblivious to the fact that poor Lazarus was right there outside his gate, and he did not recognize him nor his obligation in charity and justice to help him! In the Catholic

teaching, that is the sin of omission (not doing what one is supposed to do).

Let us pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace.

Next scene shows a reversal. Rich Man is now on one side of a great abyss, Lazarus on the other. And we may ask — What's the point? If you enjoy this life, you will pay for it in the next? More than gates have an expiration date and we all need to go through the gates that life gives to us. The word — gate — comes from the Latin word *porta* from which the word opportunity also comes. Every opportunity is a gate for entering into a world where we can make a difference. Who is on the other side can vary: a sick person, a sore person, a lonely person, those who are helpless or poor.

The Gospel passage ends with the dead Rich Man asking that the now deceased Lazarus go to the home of his brothers as a warning to change their lifestyles. Father Abraham responds that "if they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead." And someone has comeback from the dead to tell us this is our calling – Jesus, the Resurrection man. There is always some gate nearby. Open it and look at what's in front of you. We are all rich enough to share something with another person – if we do not have much in material wealth, then our time, our talents can be shared. Remember that sharing is the criterion of the Last Judgment. In Matthew's Gospel (chapter 25) we are told that all the six questions to be asked by Jesus are base on how we have shared our blessings from Him (food, drink, home, mercy and compassion) with others.
