

WORSHIP TOGETHER

1st Sunday of Advent -

(Isaiah 2:1 – 5; Romans 13: 11 – 14; Matthew 24: 37 – 44)

Advent, like its cousin Lent, is a season for prayer and reformation of our hearts. It is a season that calls us to quiet ourselves in anticipation of the birthday of Jesus. It is a Season of Hope.

One thing that we might notice, if we were able to go to Church, is that the Psalm for this weekend is the same one that we used for the feast of Christ the King – last weekend: "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord." This is no coincidence. The Church wants us to see that the ultimate goal of faith is that, when our lives on this Earth are over, we might be found worthy – in the words of Isaiah – to climb the Lord's mountain.

As we begin Advent, our Scriptures invite us to reflect on this truth, and place before us a selection of images: from the pilgrim people ascending the Lord's mountain to the light and dark of Paul's Letter to the Romans. Even the very sobering Gospel reference to Noah and the great flood is heavy with meaning and worthy of reflection. Jesus doesn't mince His words. We need to be vigilant at all times and prayerful – to stay awake. There is going to be a judgment and, like the master who plans and guards his house should it be broken into, we also need to be prepared. Nest weekend we will be hearing the fiery words of John the Baptist which continue to challenge us.

But do remember that the idea of final judgement is not limited to Advent. Each week, in our Creed (Profession of Faith), we express the belief that Christ "will come to judge the living and the dead." That judgment will be real – a review of life with its many choices and decisions, laid out before us in the light of God's revelation. We might find it difficult to reconcile this part of faith with our view of God as loving and forgiving, especially as many have a distorted understanding of God as being indulgent and accepting of all types of behavior.

How easy it is to be like the people at the time of Noah – indifferent to what was about to take place. How many hear the message, but prefer to push it off to the side or to ignore it and so lose the opportunity to be prepared. Paul puts is so well – *our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed.* The Gospel selection for today similarly challenges us to stay awake, to be like that good master. Paul is almost pleading with us to *put on Christ* – a wonderful image to reflect upon as we begin this holy season. We must remind ourselves often that this season is more than decorating and baking and shopping for Christmas Day. It is about our salvation.


We do know how the story ends / the final outcome in the conflict between good and evil: the victory of Christ! Our job is to make sure that we are on the side of victory by living lives worthy of Him. We shouldn't take eternal life for granted, but, each and every day we should renew our commitment to the Gospel and to our Baptismal call. As Christians and Catholics we are called to be realistic, to face the fact that our world is broken and in need of healing. Yet we are never without hope. For the Christian view is to see worldly imperfection not as a lost cause but as an opportunity for improvement and redemption. This is what we celebrate in this Advent time of preparation and anticipation. We look forward to the coming of Christ, striving to be vigilant and worthy to stand before our Maker and His Son, our Rederemer.

Let us pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace.
