WORSHIP TOGETHER

Christmas - (Isaiah 9: 1 - 7; Titus 2: 11 - 14; Luke 2: 1 - 14)

As we enter this holy season of Christmas, we pause to reflect and thank God for His great love for us. In churches, in homes, in some public squares we see the Christmas Crèche, Nativity Scenes depicting that first Christmas. This is a tradition that originated with St Francis of Assisi in the 13th century.

The other day as I was thinking about what to write, my mind wandered off to when I was a kid. In the room where we put up the Christmas Tree we had one of those cardboard fireplaces. And in it was a rotating bit of cellophane with a light behind it that simulated a real fire. Ah! How cozy! Not sure if such things are still available. Not sure if very many people living today (unless they grew up in the 1950's and 60's) would even know what I am talking about. But on Christmas Day we would sneak down the steps from our bedrooms, sit in front of that fireplace, turn to the tree to see what Santa left for us.

A part of our growing up included the Christmas Crèche that I mentioned above. Both in our home, and in our Grandparent's home was the small Nativity scene. Not everyone can go to see the actual birthplace of Jesus in Bethlehem, and so we recreate its presence among us by means of a simple crib.

And when we think about it, a crib or manger is actually a feeding trough. The Savior, the Son of God, chose to be born in a humble manger with animals around Him to keep Him warm. And from that manger that feeds the animals, the Savior will feed each of us. The city of Bethlehem (literally—"City of Bread" is born the Bread of Life for us). Cribs have a special attraction for children and for the child that is still within each one of us. The mysteries of the Lord are hidden from the learned and the clever and are revealed to mere children. Gathered around the figures in the straw we see the beauty of the human person in the form and features of a new-born Child. This is the Child Who is the Prince of Peace.

This Child that we see lying in straw will one day be nailed to a cross and then laid in a tomb. The Prince of Peace is the Lamb of God – the Sacrificial Lamb Who allows Himself to die in our place so that we can live with Him forever in Heaven. This same Lord tells us that we can recognize Him in one another – "whatsoever you do to the least of My brothers and sisters you do to Me." That is what St Paul is telling us when he speaks about the ambition to do good.

We are all called to celebrate Christmas every day. We do this when we live as people of hope, joy-filled individuals who give praise and thanks for Jesus Christ. We can restore peace (if only in our small corner of the world) when we offer comfort and hope. Let the light of our lives match the lights that decorate our trees and homes, and warm others (much as did that cardboard fireplace) to lessen darkness, offer comfort, give guidance, calm fears, and help all people to see that God is with us. That's how all the ends of the Earth can see the saving power of God, even where darkness seems stronger on any given day.

Let us pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace

All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

Catholic Relief Services

In response to the latest Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) report, Catholic Relief Services is warning of worsening food insecurity in Somalia while urging donors to do more to prevent the crisis from escalating. "What we're seeing on the ground is beyond tragic," said Rebecca Hallam, CRS' country representative for Kenya and Somalia. "People are dying from starvation, many of whom are women and children."

According to the latest report, which stops short of declaring famine, more than 5.6 million people are facing acute food insecurity, including more than 200,000 people facing catastrophic food shortages. Despite ongoing aid efforts, the report states that the underlying crisis has not improved, and that more "appalling" outcomes have only been temporarily averted.
