Saints for this week

January 24 - Saint Francis de Sales, bishop, Doctor of the Church

He was born near Annecy, in Savoy, studied the law, and was ordained to the priesthood despite the opposition of his father. His first mission was to re-evangelize the people of his home district (the Chablais), who had gone over to Calvinism. Always in danger of his life from hostile Calvinists, he preached with such effectiveness that after four years most of the people had returned to the Church. He was then appointed bishop of Geneva, and spent the rest of his life reforming and reorganizing the diocese, and in caring for the souls of his people by preaching and spiritual guidance.

St Francis taught that we can all attain a devout and spiritual life, whatever our position in society: holiness is not reserved for monks and hermits alone. He wrote that "religious devotion does not destroy: it perfects," and his spiritual counsel is dedicated to making people more holy by making them more themselves. In his preaching against Calvinism he was driven by love rather than a desire to win: so much so, that it was a Calvinist minister who said "if we honored anyone as a saint, I know of no-one since the days of the Apostles more worthy of it than this man."

St Francis is the patron saint of writers and journalists, who would do well to imitate his love and his moderation: as he said, "whoever wants to preach effectively must preach with love."

January 25 - Conversion of St Paul

Saul, the young man who looked after the cloaks of the men who were stoning St, grew into a dedicated and efficient persecutor of Christians. Today's feast celebrates the day that Christ appeared to him in a vision as he was on the way to Damascus, reproached him for his persecutions and converted him to the true faith.

January 26 - Saints Timothy and Titus (1st century bishops)

Timothy and Titus were converted to Christianity by St Paul, and became his companions and helpers. Paul entrusted Timothy with the care of the Christians in Ephesus, and sent Titus to Crete to look after the Christians there. He wrote them the so-called "pastoral" epistles, giving advice for pastors and people alike.

WORSHIP TOGETHER

3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - In the busy seaport of Corinth, Paul, the great apostle and preacher of Christ, came to plant the Christian Faith. It was a tremendous place to live: a thriving commercial center, full of people, full of business, full of life and activity. Religions and philosophies vied with each other for pride of place in this great metropolis. Vice and immorality also found great space and opportunities for their activities. If the Faith could be planted here, it could quickly spread to that whole area of southern Greece. Paul established a strong community of believers, but it was not long before trouble broke out. It was hard enough to live the Christian life in an environment as complex as Corinth, but even more difficult when internal dissension broke out. Factions and in-fighting developed as people competed to be *truer* Christians than others were. Dissension such as this casts a shadow over people's lives. The schism had at its roots a fight over status (ie: "*I belong to Paul, or - I belong to Apollos*"), as the Corinthians claimed superiority based on who baptized who. Living with arguments and quarrels is like living in darkness and in the shadow of death. In the body of the letter that follows, Paul will demonstrate his thesis: that believers are "*to be united in the same mind and in the same purpose lest the cross of Christ ... be emptied of its meaning.*"

In the Gospel for this weekend, we hear about fishing. What could be the common message for this weekend from Light and from fishing? Fish and fishing, in one way or another, have played a large part in the cultural life of Christianity. From Jesus calling His first apostles, to the early Christian symbol of the fish representing Christ, to eating fish on a Friday, fish have been involved. It is no accident, then, that Jesus chooses his first apostles from among fishermen. Everything that Jesus does has relevance for our salvation. The very act of casting nets and gathering speaks of the role of the apostle. Our Lord is also sanctifying the work of the disciples, and, on a practical level, He is choosing men who were physically tough, familiar with sudden storms on the Sea of Galilee, and thus choosing individuals who would be conditioned to difficult times. Soon after, He chooses Matthew, who would be able to read and write fluently - just the sort of man who would be able to record things accurately.

Today's Gospel also alludes to a sort of darkness/ those times when our work is not going so well, and when remedial work is necessary. When Jesus sees James and John, they are in their boat mending their nets. On one level, they are simply carrying out a routine task. On another level, the scene might represent all those times when our work grinds to a screeching halt, the nets are broken, the plans don't turn out the way we hoped. This happens in our wider lives as well. In a fallen world, a lot that we do can sometimes seem futile.

Whatever our line of work, whatever skills we have, whatever talents we have, we can recognize them - first of all, as gifts from God. And if we allow ourselves to co-operate with God's graces, those gifts and talents can be used to help in the building of the Kingdom. That's how it was with the first apostles whom Jesus called. That's the point Paul is trying to impress upon his audience in Corinth. Like them, we are all called to be instruments of God's graces and blessings. We are called to reflect the Light of Jesus Christ that we received when we were baptized so that others can be enlightened and know the right way to live their lives/ mend their wayward ways. We are to allow that Light of Jesus Christ to dispel the dark ways of the world so that thru us others may be encouraged and strengthened.

To be children of God/ children of the Light means that we work to break down all that divides the larger human family. To walk in the Light means that we are disciples, willing to give up the things we cling to and consider so important, and instead choose to follow Christ.

Let us open our hearts to hear our names called by the Good Shepherd as He called the apostles. Let us open our hearts to Christ, the Light of the World, praying that we will respond when we hear our names called, as did the first disciples.

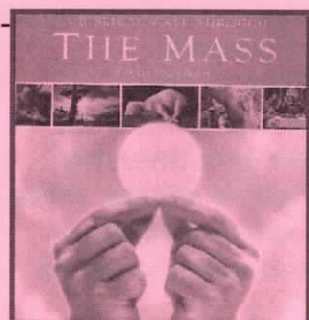
Prayer for the Respect of All Life
