

St Patrick - March 17 - was born about 385 in Roman

Britain. He was seized from his father's farm at age sixteen by Irish raiders who sold him into slavery in pagan Ireland. Six years later he escaped and returned to his home. His captivity, however, had a deep religious effect on him and he longed to bring his Christian faith to the Irish people. In a dream, he heard "the voice of the Irish" calling him back. Following his studies, he was ordained about the year 417. About 432 Patrich was appointed bishop and he went to Ireland to succeed Bishop Palladius. There, he was welcomed and he soon established churches throughout the country, Even though he was fiercely opposed by the pagan Druids, he



was able to convert many. I Patrick's own account of his conversion and missionary life (known as the Confessio), he sees himself as a humble instrument in God's hands, given gifts of wisdom and strength to bring an alien people to the true faith. Patrick died in 461, and is the patron of Ireland.

Church

3rd Sunday of Lent-a

Over the last couple of weeks, we have been hearing readings that are meant to help us with our Lenten Journey. The 1st Sunday of Lent we heard of the Temptations of Christ in the Desert – temptations by Satan.

Last week we heard of the Transfiguration – and in that message we were reminded that regardless where our life's experiences take us, we have been given the message of hope – the same message that the apostles received at the Transfiguration – a message of hope that promises a brighter future with God in eternity.

This week our readings speak of water – and not just ordinary water. The O.T. Book of Exodus is a story of the wandering Israelites which is not to flattering for them. Despite all that God had done for them – the miracles of being freed from Pharoah, the miracle of the Red Sea, and so many other, we find them in the desert complaining – they miss "the fleshpots" of Egypt, the variety of fruits and vegetables. In today's selection we hear them quarreling with Moses again and again over their thirst. With all that God had already done for them, they are human, and as such they are looking for more assurances that God is with them, that He has not left them alone.

Paul's short selection in his letter to the Church of Rome reminds us that Salvation in Christ awaits the believer who first has "faith." We see such an "awaiting" in the Gospel selection as a woman at the well encounters Jesus – the source of live-giving waters.

The woman does not have a very nice background.

FIRST of all – she is Samaritan and the Jews did not have anything to do with the Samaritans.

Then, there's the fact that she's a woman. Men did not speak to women in public.

She's at the well by herself. Typically the women travelled in groups to do their errands, such as this. The fact that she is by herself tells us that whatever her background and reputation was, the other women of the town did not want to associate with her, or be seen associating with her, lest they are considered on her level.

She is surprised that Jesus knows so much about her – some things that she probably wished He did not know. NEVER -THE-LESS, Jesus, in His dialogue with her, offers a gift that she cannot resist asking about: "I can give you water so that you never thirst again."

When you and I were baptized, the Holy Spirit was given to us and we became one with Jesus Christ. By His gift of self on the cross, Jesus gave us living water and offered us the wellsprings of salvation. God quenches our thirst when we are willing to be vulnerable – like the woman – and empty ourselves of whatever keeps us from believing that God's love can transform us. Reflect on that love. Give thanks for the times that Jesus has been present to you, and then empowered you to be present to others. Every-day random acts of kindness can open up the wellsprings of salvation of us and for others.

Jesus was there for the woman – and performed a random act of kindness – HE WELCOMED HER. He let her know that despite her background she was still important and that God still loved her. We Can Do the same for others.

Let us pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace.

Something to Think About -

I came across the following and thought I'd share it with all of us as we continue our Lenten Journey. It's entitled LENT: A Time for Traditions and it's from the recent Greensburg Diocesan Council of the National Council of Catholic Women newsletter.

Spring is the season when seeds start to sprout, beginning their pilgrimage through the cold dark earth into the light. The word "lent" comes from the Anglo-Saxon word for springtime. In springtime, sunlight, water and rich soil help plants grow. Our Lenten growth is nurtured by the three disciplines of Lent, (fasting, almsgiving and prayer). Discipline is often associated with punishment, but it comes from the same word as disciple, a word that means learner or pupil. Be a learner this Lent and let God's grace help us all to grow as disciples.
