For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

## Trinity Sunday - (Exodus 34: 4 - 6; 2; Corinthians 13: 11 - 13; John 3: 16 - 18)

"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the loved of God the Father, and the communion with the Holy Spirit be with you."

"And also with you."

This is a dialogue that we should recognize as beginning every celebration of the Holy Mass. In this dialogue, we call each other to live the image and likeness of our Triune God. We wish each other God's grace, participation in the life of God. Grace is a gift given to us by Jesus Christ, God made visible. By being merciful, slow to anger, and rich in kindness and fidelity, God's self-description to Moses, we manifest grace. The Holy Spirit, the life force within God and between God and us, unites us with God and with each other. This communion through the Holy Spirit is a great gift and a real challenge.

After the Easter Season, which concludes with the celebration of Pentecost, two Sundays commemorate the solemnities of the Most Holy Trinity, and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. On Trinity Sunday we are reminded that "God so loved the world that He sent His only Son" (John 3: 16 - 18). The following Sunday highlights the Eucharist. In the Gospel reading from John 6: 51 - 58, Jesus announces that He is the living bread come down from Heaven.

In the first reading for Trinity Sunday, the Book of Exodus picks up the story of the giving of the Law after the debacle of the golden calf. In Moses' lengthy absence as he communed with God on Mt Sinai, the people began to doubt his return. In their fear and anxiety, they convinced Aaron to build and worship a golden calf, an image of pagan gods. Moses petitions God on their behalf, "yet pardon our wickedness and sins, and receive us as Your own."

In Paul's Second letter to the Corinthian Church, we hear the conclusion of the so-called "Letter of Tears", in which Paul strongly reprimands the Corinthians and charges them to mend their ways and live in peace. The Corinthians have questioned Paul's legitimacy as an apostle, since he does not preach with the same eloquence as the so called "super apostles" (2 Corinthians 11:5). These outsider preachers have upset the community, causing them to question what they first learned from Paul.

In the Gospel, John states clearly that God's love has not abated, despite human mistakes. "For God so loved the world..." The passage is part of a conversation between Jesus and a would-be disciple, Nicodemus, who comes to Jesus at night. Johannine imagery of light and dark gives the reader clues as to how to interpret the encounter. Nicodemus doesn't understand Jesus' invitation to be born again. So Jesus explains more fully: "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through Him." After Jesus' death, Nicodemus will appear again. This time, he stands in the "light." Through the cross, he has come to insight, and he brings the spices to help in Jesus' burial (John 19:39).

The doctrine of the Trinity strikes many, both Christians and non-Christians, as one of the more exotic and esoteric of Christian doctrines. Somehow, three divine persons add up to one God. But today's scriptures cut to the heart of the matter. The doctrine of the Trinity is our way of understanding the truth that we live every day as Christians and Catholics: that God the Father has saved us through His Son Jesus Christ and made us into one people, united in the Holy Spirit. It is the experience of this salvation that is at the root of our knowledge of God as Trinity.

God is, from all eternity, a communion of love shared among Father, Son, and Spirit. It is because God includes us in this eternal love through becoming one of us in Jesus that we have eternal live. Our salvation is nothing less than our inclusion in the love that is the Holy Trinity. This is one reason why Paul exhorts the Corinthians to "encourage one another, agree with one another, and live in peace." It is through actions such as these that our lives mirror the communion of love that is the Trinity.

The doctrine of the Trinity might be thought of as the affirmation that Who God shows Himself to be in the story of salvation is Who God truly is in eternity.

Let Us Pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace!
