

For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

June 13 - St Antony of Padua (1195? - 1231)

Saint Antony was first of all an Augustinian monk, but he was so impressed by the martyrdom of five Franciscans who had been spreading the faith in Morocco that he became a Franciscan friar himself, so that he could preach the gospel in Africa too. Illness obliged him to leave Morocco, and a storm then drove his ship to Sicily, so that he found himself taking part in the General Chapter of the Franciscans in 1221, where he met Saint Francis of Assisi himself. His preaching career then took him to northern Italy and southern France, then a stronghold of the Albigensian heresy. Later he returned to Italy, to Padua, where he was an outstanding preacher and the first Franciscan theologian. His sermons are full of gentleness, but he reproved the wicked with fearless severity – especially backsliding clergy and the oppressors of the weak. His shrine is a center of pilgrimage, and he is also the patron saint of the lost and found.

June 16 - **The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus** - Devotion to the Sacred Heart, encouraged by mediaeval mystics and promoted by St Gertrude, St Margaret Mary Alacoque, St John Eudes and others, represents a devotion to Jesus in his human nature, in particular referring to the heart as the seat of the emotions.

June 17 - Them Immaculate Heart of Mary (celebrated the Saturday following the 2nd Sunday after Pentecost) - Devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary began as early as the twelfth century. During the 17th century in France, St John Eudes popularized this devotion along with that to the Sacred Heart. St Luke's Gospel twice mentions that Mary "kept all these things in her heart", pondering the word of God. Mary shows us how to listen to the words the Holy Spirit speaks to us in the depths of our hearts, and how to respond in faith.



June 14 - Flag Day - In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress.

Feast of the Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ -

(Deuteronomy 8: 2-3, 14-16; I Corinthinas 10: 16-17; John 6: 51-58)

In 1263, a German priest named Peter of Prague was troubled by doubts he had about the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. So he decided to make a pilgrimage to Rome and pray for guidance in his troubles along the way. On the way to Rome, he came to a small town in central Italy called Bolsena. While celebrating Mass there, something amazing happened. As the priest held a host and said the words of consecration, blood started to seep out of the host onto his hands and then onto the linen cloth on the altar that we call the corporal.

He soon asked to be taken to the nearby city of Orvieto where he knew that Pope Urban IV was then staying. The pope had the incident investigated and no natural explanation could be found for it. Pope Urban had the blood-stained host and corporal put on display in the cathedral in Orvieto. The corporal is still there today to be reverenced by the faithful.

This Eucharistic miracle led Pope Urban to establish the solemnity that we celebrate today – The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, which is also known by its Latin name – Corpus Christi. It was celebrated for the first time in the following year – 1264.

Staying with the pope at the time of the miracle was Thomas Aquinas. Pope Urban commissioned Thomas to compose prayers and hymn texts for the solemnity. O Saving Victim – known in the original Latin as O Salutaris Hostia – is still sung today, usually at the start of Eucharistic adoration. Another hymn – Tantum Ergo - or Down in Adoration Falling, is another of the hymns by Thomas.

As great as a gift as the feast and its beautiful hymn texts continue to be for us Catholics some 750 years later, they are all together simply a reminder to us that Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament journeys at our side as we make our pilgrimage through this world to our Heavenly homeland. Just as the Lord fed the people of Israel with manna from Heaven through their forty-year journey to the Promised Land, so He feeds us with Himself – the Bread of Life – as we are tested by the afflictions in this life. We are not alone in our struggles. Jesus, the Bread of Life, the Good Shepherd is always with us – carrying us if need be. What a great comfort it can be for us to know that Our Lord and so many believers are truly one with us when we struggle to live out our calling from day to day.
