For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

St Peter - "I do so love St Peter," says a friend of mine. "Whenever he opens his mouth, he puts his foot in it". She is right, of course. Whatever else St Peter may be, he is not the model of a wise and noble hero. He walks on the water – but then panics and starts to sink. He makes the first profession of faith – and moments later blunders into error and is called Satan by the Lord. He refuses to be washed, and then, when the purpose is explained to him, demands to be washed all over. And, of course, he betrays his Master soon after having been warned that he will, and swore that he would never deny Jesus. If Peter is the rock on which the Church is built, what a fissured and friable rock it is! The choosing of Peter teaches us a lesson. The Church's foundation-stone and its first leader is not all-wise, all-knowing, good, heroic, and beautiful. He is a very ordinary man who makes about as many mistakes as we would in his place, and kicks himself for them just as thoroughly afterwards. If St Peter had been a hero, we could easily have despaired of ever becoming like him. If St Peter had been great, and noble, and good, we could have told ourselves that the Church is for the saints, despaired, sat down, and not bothered. But the Church is not just for saints: it is for confused, impetuous, cowardly people like us – or St Peter. The rock crumbles, the ropes are frayed, the wood is rotten – but, although that improbable building, the Church, is made of such inferior materials, it grows (on the whole) faster than it collapses, and it is grace that holds it together.

In the end, it was grace that gave the coward the courage to bear witness when it counted, grace that gave the fool the wisdom he needed to set the infant Church on her way, grace that taught the impetuous man patience and forbearance.

We none of us admire ourselves, however much we would like to; let us not try to admire St Peter either, but admire instead the grace he was given, and pray that, weak as we are, we may be given it too, and may use it.

St Paul - originally a zealous Pharisee who was out to destroy the Christian Faith. Paul has a conversion experience on the road to Damascus as he is planning another mass persecution of the early Christians. Paul becomes a fighter for the Christian Faith, uses his knowledge of the Law to prove his reason for conversion. His travels are extensive to the cities of Damascus, Jerusalem, Antioch and then criss-crossed the cities of Asia Minor establishing communities of Christians among the gentiles. Because of his activity he suffered constant harassment from his enemies. He ministered to the Corinthians, Ephesians, Galatians, and Romans. Paul's Epistles / Letters make up the bulk of the New Testament. After imprisonment in Rome, he was beheaded along the Ostian Way where his burial place is still venerated

(Jeremiah 20: 10 - 13; Romans 5: 12 - 15; Matthew 10: 26 - 33)

Often, when I am doing home visits / Communion Calls with people, the conversation may turn to their particular fears. When I ask them to share their fears, some of their answers deal with the future, changes in their lives especially regarding their health, a past secret being made public, rejection, being alone, and ultimately their death. Other fears deal with the conditions in the world – and many of them, having lived thru some wicked wars, fear the threat of our country being called into the action of a brutal war.

I'll ask them if there is any way we can control or alter any of those fears, and they come to realize that they cannot. So – what can we do to "have no fear"? Trust God's promise to be with us to find a way to face whatever comes our way. That sounds a lot like the wisdom of Jeremiah that we hear in this weekend's first reading: "The Lord is with me, like a mighty champion: my persecutors... will not prevail" (Jeremiah 20:11).

Being aware of God's presence and His grace, makes all the difference. We know the overflowing gift of God's grace through Jesus Christ, as Paul shares in his letter to the Church in Rome.

We live in unsettled times. Issues are brewing across the globe, whether in North Korea, Russia, or in our very own country. Conflicts and divisions seem to be deepening every day and the news headlines constantly reveal more. We hesitate to have our children play outside alone, we fear being vulnerable in public places, and things we normally could trust are being called into question. Fear is an emotion not only becoming more common, but becoming justifiable in light of our current situation. But we are people of faith and Jesus clearly makes the point that fear has no place in the life of the disciple. Matthew's Gospel specifically tells us: "Fear no one." Imagined, crippling fear can prevent us from discovering and enjoying life's beauty and developing our true potential.

This is the place where our readings bring us this week. As people of faith, we are called to trust that we are being led by God and that God's presence is with us. Jeremiah the prophet understood this, as did Jesus. God values us - and even the hairs on our head are counted. In the end, if we believe in God's promise then nothing can ever really happen to us. We cannot be destroyed. Our world is a challenging place to live. Life can be unstable and innocent people are hurt every day. In response, we can develop a fear of our world so great that it prevents us from actually living. As children of God and followers of Jesus, we need to consider the strength of our faith.

Not everyone is familiar with the name St Francis de Sales. And if we know the name, we may not be familiar with any of his teachings. One of his better known quotes teaches: "Do not look forward to what may happen tomorrow; the same everlasting Father who cares for you today will take care of you tomorrow and every day. Either He will shield you from suffering, or He will give you unfailing strength to bear that suffering. Be at peace, then, put aside all anxious thoughts and imaginations, and say continually: 'The Lord is my strength and my shield; my heart has trusted in Him and I am helped. He is not only with me, but in me, and I in Him."

Those of you who are old enough to remember him, or those of us who have read history, may recall the words of Franklin Delano Roosevelt in his first inaugural address: "There is nothing to fear but fear itself." – By saying this, FDR was telling the American people that their fear was making things worse. (He goes on to say, "nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyzes needed efforts to convert retreat into advance)." We need to remember that FDR became president during the Great Depression. Banks were closing. People were running to the banks and taking their money out. They were causing more damage to the economy. And so the government had to close banks for several days and call Congress back to Washington for a special session giving the American people and government time to calm down and make recovery plans.

Have no fear – easier said than done, *but* not impossible. Try this little exercise to calm down when fears get to you. Recall that you are always in God's presence. With that awareness, name your fears. Take a deep breath and give those fears to God as you release that breath. Then breathe deeply into your entire being the all-encompassing presence of God and let Him carry those fears. And - that's what Jesus the Good Shepherd promises us – that He will protect and guide us and carry our problems on His shoulders.

Let Us Pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace!

CRS Spotlight

Hundreds of unaccompanied children have crossed the border from Sudan into Chad in recent weeks as fighting separates families and forces minors to make the arduous journey to safety without their parents. Humanitarian workers say "more and more" children are arriving alone in the neighbouring country, to which more than 100,000 refugees, about 60% of them under-18s, have fled since fighting erupted between rival military factions in mid-April. Catholic Relief Services recently spoke with The Guardian about how the incoming rainy season is going to make it harder for aid groups to reach them. Recently, a CRS team had travelled to the Sila region of southeastern Chad last week to assess the refugees' needs and had planned to distribute food as well as other crucial items such as mosquito nets, plastic sheeting and water-purification tablets. But they couldn't cross because of a river flooding to get to the site, so they were obliged to go back. Visit www.crs.org for more information and to see how you can help!


