For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

Saints for this Week - July 3 - St Thomas, apostle - one of the twelve apostles, was a Jew from Galilee called by Jesus to accompany Him on His mission to proclaim the Kingdom of God. When Jesus' life was threatened as He went to raise Lazarus from the dead, Thomas said to the others, "Let us also go, that e may die with Him." At the Last Supper, when Jesus spoke of going away to His Father, Thomas replied, "Lord, we do not know where You are going, and how can we know the way?" Perhaps, best known, on that first Easter Sunday, Thomas was not with the others when Jess came into the room where they were. Though they told him, "We have seen the Lord!", Thomas answered, "I will not believe until I put my finger into the nail marks in His hands and His side." The expression - "Doubting Thomas" comes from this incident. The date of Thomas' death is unknown.

13th Sunday in Ordinary Time - (2 Kings 4:8-11, 13-16; Romans 6:3-4,8-11; Matthew 10: 37-42)

Our Christian Duty, and hospitality. What do these two have in common as a follower of Jesus?

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German Lutheran pastor and theologian, is one of the Christian heroes of the last century. In his native land, he argued strenuously against Hitler's euthanasia program and his genocidal attack on the Jews. Because of this opposition, Bonhoeffer was imprisoned and later sent to a concentration camp. He was executed by the Nazis towards the end of the war. The doctor who was present at his execution recorded how he was moved by the calm and prayerful spirit in which the heroic pastor faced death.

In 1937, Bonhoeffer had written a book called – in its English translation – *The Cost of Discipleship*, which has become a modern spiritual classic. In it he warns against the notion of "cheap grace", which he describes as "grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ". The "cheap grace" approach emphasizes the more attractive and consoling aspects of Christianity, with little or no reference to the demands made upon those who follow Jesus. Bonhoeffer insists that to leave out the difficult aspects of Christianity – such as repentance, discipline, confession, discipleship, the cross – is to offer an incomplete version – a "cheap" version, of God's grace and of discipleship.

Among the many different Christian religions, the teaching is that Jesus paid it all. While this is true, there is still something that is required on our parts. God's grace is a free gift. On our own, we could never get to Heaven. God's free gift of grace helps us. Yet, we hear Jesus' parables of the "unproductive fig tree, or the 10 who did not bring enough oil to the wedding feast, or the one that teaches: when I was hungry, when I was thirsty, etc." Even in the letter of James we are reminded that "faith without works is dead." And so – Bonhoeffer, in writing this book, is reminding all of us that to be a follower of Jesus requires a little something on our parts.

This weekend's readings focus both on this point as well as on that of hospitality. If we are to treat one another with consideration and respect, then we should do our best to welcome the stranger among us and assist them in whatever way that we can. The prophet Elisha benefitted from this kindness when, on his journeys, he was invited to take food and shelter with the woman of Shunem. As one act of kindness prompts another in return, Elisha promises the woman that God will reward her with a child of her own. Jesus takes up this theme of welcome and expresses Himself energetically on the importance of being friendly to others. We do not have to be wealthy in this world's goods to be able to give hospitality. A simple smile of welcome, a word of gratitude, or – as in today's Gospel – a cup of cold water. It really doesn't take much to be "Christ" for others. And when we are in a good relationship with those around us, we are in a good relationship with Jesus, and the opposite is true: when we are in a good relationship with Jesus, then we come to realize that that good relationship involves welcoming others in the name of Jesus.

Bonhoeffer's views reflect what we've heard in the S/S Readings. Jesus makes no bones about it: following Him will make demands of us, for He must be the center of our lives, no matter what the cost. By way of extreme example, He insists that even the most precious relationships – such as those between children and parents, must not be allowed to come between us and Him. Of course, this does not mean that the bonds of love within a family are of no importance. Quite the contrary – they are of supreme importance – but we cannot allow even these relationships – or the views presented by those closest to us – to be a barrier between us and our duty to God.


Baptism asks the same of us. We are to live for God and for all who belong to God in Jesus Christ. Making our relationship with Jesus as a primary goal is important. It helps us to take up our crosses – be they afflictions, mortifications, troubles and contradictions that come our way in life.

Being a follower – a true and authentic follower – of Jesus is always a costly business. At times it makes painful demands on us that go against our instinctive desires. It sometimes makes us feel that we are out of step with the rest of humanity, that we are losing out on life. But Jesus makes an extraordinary promise: "Anyone who loses his life for My sake will find it." Put another way – whatever the apparent losses now, the profits will be immeasurably greater in the future."

St Paul powerfully makes this point quite clear – while we may seem poor or only half alive to the unbelieving world, it is we who are rich, possessing everything, and fully alive.

CRS Spotlight for 7/2/23

Hundreds of unaccompanied children have crossed the border from Sudan into Chad in recent weeks as fighting separates families and forces minors to make the arduous journey to safety without their parents. Humanitarian workers say "more and more" children are arriving alone in the neighbouring country, to which more than 100,000 refugees, about 60% of them under-18s, have fled since fighting erupted between rival military factions in mid-April.

Catholic Relief Services recently spoke with The Guardian about how the incoming rainy season is going to make it harder for aid groups to reach them. Recently, a CRS team had travelled to the Sila region of southeastern Chad last week to assess the refugees' needs and had planned to distribute food as well as other crucial items such as mosquito nets, plastic sheeting and waterpurification tablets. But they couldn't cross because of a river flooding to get to the site, so they were obliged to go back. Visit www.crs.org for more information and to see how you can help!
