For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.





As we continue in Ordinary Time on our Liturgical Calendar, a little background on this season. In total, there are 34 weeks of Ordinary Time. The rest of the Liturgical Year consists of our special seasons such as Advent and Christmas, Lent and Easter, and a few Solemnities of the Lord that fall on Sundays (such as those we celebrated over the past few weeks). Don't try to add them all up – they don't always make 52 weeks. That's because each year we have to skip a few "ordinary time" weeks so as to fit in the special seasons and feasts. The last Sunday we celebrated in Ordinary Time was the Eighth Sunday – that was before the Season of Lent began. Today, after Lent, Easter, and the special Solemnities, we pick up with the 14th Sunday.

"Ordinary" is a word that does not capture the importance of what we celebrate, because what we celebrate each Sunday is always extraordinary. Officially called the Lord's Day, every Sunday is always a celebration of the Resurrection. It is a day on which we celebrate Jesus Christ the Lord and call to mind the Last Supper, the Passion and the Resurrection. Each Sunday is a day on which we celebrate Christ's continuing physical presence in our world. Each Sunday is a day on which, when we once again encounter the physical presence of Christ in the Eucharist, we gain hope, joy, strength and courage to live the Christian lifestyle.

Each Sunday is not only a day on which we encounter the physical presence of Christ, it is a day on which by the mere fact of gathering together "in communion," as a community of faith, we become the Body of Christ - the Church. It is most difficult to be part of the Church if we do not gather with the Church. To "blow off" Sunday worship at Mass, or to think of Sunday and gathering with our community only casually should cause us to question the depth of our desire to be with Jesus.

The Season of Ordinary Time is marked by the color green. The theological virtue of hope is also symbolized by the green – just as the burning fire of love, or the blood of martyrs, is symbolized by red. Green is the color of growing things, and hope-like growing things – is always new and always fresh. Ord


Many of us enjoyed an extended holiday weekend, this past week, because of the Fourth of July holiday. For us as American citizens, it is virtually impossible for us to avoid celebrating this wonderful holiday. We still feel compelled to celebrate the freedom we have. When Jesus said, "Do this in memory of Me," He was partially desirous of creating the compulsion in us to gather weekly to celebrate our *spiritual* freedom.

Today's Gospel selection is probably one of the best-known, most-quoted and hope-filled passages of Sacred Scripture. Countless people have found comfort as they have faced difficulties too great for them to handle, or perhaps at the end of a busy day when the idea of resting in God's presence, even if only for a few minutes, has been enough to give a new burst of life and comfort. When Jesus told His listeners that they could come to Him, it was at a time when He Himself had little time to spare, encountering not only those who loved Him, but also those who could not cope with His message and sought ways of silencing Him. Jesus was busy, but not too busy to welcome those who were sick and troubled, those regarded as important or considered unimportant, young people and old people. To Jesus, everybody is of value and worth taking the time for. That is why He made time for others, regardless of the pressures He faced. He is the "yoke", He is the one willing to carry our often "heavy loads" through life.

On our Sundays throughout the remainder of Ordinary Time, we will explore the extraordinary life of Jesus and what that life has to offer us. The Scriptures will call us to see that, apart from Christ, we have no real kingdom that can bring us the peace we most want to have. We will see that apart from the community of faith we cannot be part of Christ's body.

saints for the Week - July 11 - St Benedict - brother of St Scholastica, was born in Italy in the year 480. His family was wealthy and he was educated in Romewhen barbarian invasions and moral decline seriously threatened to destroy the city and the Roman empire. Disgusted with the moral decline of his companions and society in general, Benedict left Rome and lived in the village of Enfide for a number of years. About the year 500, Benedicet went to the wild and remote area of Subiaco. While there, he came under the tutelage of the monk, Romanus. Benedict became a monk—living a life of prayer and solitude in a cave, attracting many followers, and by 525 he had founded twelve monasteries in Subiaco. Benedict is known for what we know today as "The Benedictine Rule" which is used in the formation of those who follow the "Benedictine Rule".
