For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.



Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord -

(Daniel 7: 9 - 10, 13 - 14; 2 Peter 1: 16 - 19; Matthew 17: 1 - 9)

Typically we would be celebrating the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time, this weekend, but since August 6 falls on a Sunday, we have the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. The relationships among the three Scripture Readings are tightly knit and structured to deliver the transfiguring promise of full life. Taken together, the readings are charged with the light and life greater than the light and life that are so abundant in nature right now. The Old Testament Book of Daniel is grouped with the prophetic books. However, much of the writing in Daniel carries the vision of an apocalypse, which the Israelites most certainly hoped for. The Jews at the time of this writing were mightily resisting the forced Helenization of the culture as Roman power gave way to Greek dominance. The Jews had every reason to complain: "If it's not one thing, it's another." Today we read of a view of the world "from heaven's vantage point." The Jews must have been consoled with the promise that the days of the dominant enemy are numbered and the Son of Man would come in triumph and establish an eternal Kingdom. The image of the bright light of the eternal God and of the Son of Man descending from the clouds of heaven is complemented perfectly in the Gospel, which speaks of Jesus' face shining like the sun, His clothes dazzling white.

With Jesus in this Transfiguration scene is Moses - the Lawgiver, and Elijah - the greatest Old Testament prophet. They are engaged in conversation with Jesus. This holy meeting stuns the apostles. Only Peter finds the words that reflect both his amazement and his memory of the Scripture: "Lord, let us build three tents here as a remembrance - one for You, one for Moses, and one for Elijah!" After all, the Jews of old regularly constructed places holy to the Lord. Even to this day, we construct monuments to remember special people, places, or events.

The reading from Peter tells us what life with and in Jesus meant to the early Christian community. Those to whom the letter is addressed are surrounded by people persuaded by mystery religions that have all the easy, comforting answers. In counterpoint to such religions, we get the satisfying news that Jesus is the One Whom the Heavens revealed – both at His baptism: "You are My beloved Son" (Mark 1:11), and at the mountain of Transfiguration which we hear today. There is no border, no dividing line between the beloved Son and his beloved people. All share in His death and resurrection. That is the quiet promise flashing forth at the mount of the Transfiguration and realized in the death and resurrection. The writer of the second letter of Peter relies on this faith-knowing absolutely. His faith is the light by which he sees and enjoins us to see. The image is rich and beautiful. It is poetry. The flame of faith must burn in one's heart like a lamp in the night.

The way that we know that such a flame is burning brightly is to live our lives just as Jesus lived His life while He walked the Earth in His human body. For us, that requires a continual conversion / an ongoing turning back to the Lord and His ways. Sound familiar? It should. Turning back to the Lord is a dominant Lenten theme, and it is an ongoing theme for the person who considers themselves to be a follower of Jesus. May we keep the bright flame of faith always alive in our minds and hearts.


Let Us Pray for the Conversion of the World & for Peace!

August 11 - St Lawrence - Lawrence was one of the seven deacons of the Church of Rome and was executed on August 10, 258—four days after Sixtus II and his companions were martyred during the persecutions of the Emperor Valerian. By now, few of the facts of his life are known for certain. According to tradition, Lawrence, aware that he was also to be martyred, began to distribute the monies and treasures of the Church to the city's poor. The Roman prefect, hearing about this, wanted the wealth for the government, so he promised Lawrence clemency, if he would show him where the Church's gold and silver were. Lawrence asked for three days to gather the treasure. Then he went through the city and invited all the poor and misfortunate supported by the Church to come together. When the prefect arrived, he saw the treasure of the Church: the blind, the maimed, the lepers, the orphans, and the old. The prefect was so angry that he had a great gridiron prepared with hot coals beneath it and had Lawrence placed on it. Thus - Lawrence's association with the gridiron. After the martyr had suffered pain for a long time, the legend concludes, Lawrence cheerfully declared: "I'm well done on this side. Turn me over!" From this Lawrence derives his patronage of cooks, chefs, and comedians.

In April 2023, armed conflict broke out between two warring factions in Sudan. The ongoing war has displaced over 3 million people internally and into neighboring countries. The resulting humanitarian crisis has limited people's access to food, clean water, healthcare and shelter. Over the past 3 months, CRS has distributed 2,942.5 metric tons of food from the World Food Programmer to over 100,000 people in Central Darfur.
