For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

August 15 - Feast of the Assumption of Mary

On November 1, 1950, Pope Piux XII declared the Assumption of the Blessed Mother a doctrine of faith. The taking up of the body and soul of the Mother of God into heaven was celebrated in Jerusalem as far back as the fifth century. Gradually, various churches of East and West made it part of their calendar.

This Feast is a Holy Day of Obligation meaning Catholics are obliged to attend Mass on this day.

19 Sunday in Ordinary Time

(I Kings 19: 9, 11 – 13; Romans 9: 1 – 5; Matthew 14: 22 – 33)

A story is told of a small Midwest farming community in the middle of a dark winter's night. The two-story home of a young family caught fire. Quickly, parents and children followed their well-practiced emergency plan and made their way through the smoke-filled home out into the front lawn. There the father quickly counted heads and realized that their 5 year old son was not among them. Suddenly he heard the small voice and looked up to see the boy at his bedroom window, crying and rubbing his eyes. Knowing the danger of reentering the house to rescue his son, the father called, "Jump, Son! I'll catch you!" Between sobs, the boy responded to the voice he knew so well, "But I can't see you, Daddy!" The father answered with great assurance. "No, Son, you can't see me, but I can see you. Jump! And I'll catch you." At that, the boy jumped into the smoky darkness and found himself safely cradled in his father's arms. Today's Sacred Scripture Readings reflect upon trust – about having faith- about being able to discern the fact that our God is always with us.

From the Book of Kings, we read how Elijah the prophet, who had defeated the 450 false priests of Baal with the help of just such a trusting faith in the power of God, encountered the Lord God on Mt Horeb. As we continue through Paul's letter to the Church in Rome, Paul laments and mourns over the Jews who, having lost their faith in God and His prophets, had rejected their promised Messiah – Jesus.

And in the Gospel passage, what we read took place during and unexpected storm on the Sea of Galilee in the very early morning hours. As Jesus approached the apostles, miraculously walking on water, He allayed their fears by telling them – "It is I." The Gospel episode also explains how Peter lost his trusting faith in Jesus for a few seconds and consequently failed during his attempt to walk on water.

Many times we need to envision that lake scene – the disciples in their boat being battered by a storm. We need to envision this scene, especially at those times when our life's problems seem to be an overpowering storm ready to sink us or those times when we feel we do not have much to offer. And we need to realize that Jesus is with us, just as He was with the disciples on that stormy night, saying to us in His calm and collected voice, "Do not be afraid!" (I am here for you.)

Also, keep in mind – that when Peter took his attention from Christ and focused on the strength of the wind, he began to sink. Whenever we in our lives take our attention off Christ and focus on the problems and worries of the day, that's usually when we feel our worst and feel as though we, too, are sinking. Let us learn from today's readings that Christ is always with us to support us in all our endeavors, and may we always remain focused on Him – thanking Him for His continual presence and support in our lives. We may not be able to see Him, but He is always there for us.

Saints for this week

August 14 - St Maximilian Kolbe - (1894 - 1941)

He was born on 8 January 1894 in occupied Poland: he joined the Franciscans in Lwów in 1910, and was ordained eight years later, as his country became free and independent for the first time in over 120 years. He believed that the world was passing through a time of intense spiritual crisis, and that Christians must fight for the world's salvation with all the means of modern communication. He founded a newspaper, and a sodality called the Knights of Mary Immaculate, which spread widely both in Poland and abroad.

In 1927 he founded a community, a "city of Mary," at Teresin: centred round the Franciscan friary, it attracted many lay people, and became self-supporting, publishing many periodicals and running its own radio station. In 1930 he went to Japan, studied Buddhism and Shintoism, and through the Japanese edition of his newspaper spread the Christian message in a way that was in harmony with Japanese culture. In Nagasaki, he set up a "Garden of the Immaculate," which survived the atomic bomb. He also travelled to Malabar and to Moscow, but was recalled to Poland in 1936 for reasons of health.

When the Germans invaded in 1939, the community at Teresin sheltered thousands of refugees, most of them Jews. In 1941 he was arrested and sent to the concentration camp at Auschwitz, where he helped and succored the inmates. In August of that year a prisoner escaped, and in reprisal the authorities were choosing ten people to die by starvation. One of the men had a family, and Maximilian Kolbe offered to take his place. The offer was accepted, and he spent his last days comforting his fellow prisoners.

The man he saved was present at his canonization.



CRS Spotlight for Sunday, 8/13/23

Sudan's armed conflict has caused a humanitarian crisis, threatening millions of lives. About 24.7 million people (half of Sudan's population) are in need of humanitarian aid and protection. Hunger and malnutrition in Sudan were already at record levels before the conflict erupted - but now, up to 2.5 million additional people in Sudan are expected to slip into hunger because of the ongoing violence, bringing the total number of people facing acute food insecurity to over 19 million. Out of these, over 3 million children are estimated to be acutely malnourished.

CRS and partners continue to work despite the challenges, providing food, emergency
