

For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

Exodus 22:21-27; 1 Thessalonians 1:5-10; Matthew 22:34-40

We know of a **hinge**. It is a flexible device that allows the turning or pivoting of a part, such as a door or lid, on a stationary frame. Normally, a door, for example, hangs on **two hinges** (put on upper and lower portions of the door). When one hinge becomes detached, the other can no longer support the weight of the door and becomes unhinged too eventually. As long as the good hinges are screwed or attached tightly in the wood, the door can easily be opened. But, once one hinge gives way, it would be impossible or difficult to open the door.

Our Christian life is like a door that hangs on two hinges: love for God and love for neighbor. These two hinges are seen in the 10 commandments and in the Lord's Prayer. Jesus emphasizes the importance of these two hinges, quoting the Old Testament texts that command us to love God with all our heart and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Jesus puts equal weight on these two commandments, showing that they are closely connected and complementary. Love for God and love for neighbor should not be separated; they are both essential. Jesus teaches that the whole of Scripture should be interpreted in the light of this commandment of love, giving it singular and paramount importance.

The love Jesus speaks of is not just an emotional feeling, but a decision of the will. Our lives become meaningful when we decide to fully love God and our neighbors. Our acts of charity and worship should not exempt us from loving others, and our religious practices should not justify mistreating or cheating others. God emphasizes the importance of not oppressing the vulnerable, such as resident aliens, widows, orphans, and the poor. To truly love God is to reach out to the least of our brothers and sisters, as we encounter Jesus in their need.

St. Paul praises the faith shown by the Thessalonians, who have become a model community. We are called to let others see the love of God at work in our lives, and our faith, informed by love, should be active in promoting justice and performing works of mercy.

To maintain these two hinges of our Christian life, we need to continually choose to love God with all our being and to love our neighbors as ourselves. We can do this by seeking a deep relationship with God through prayer, worship, and obedience to His will, and by actively showing love and compassion to those around us.
