For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.



31st Sunday Ordinary Time

Today, Jesus denounces the scribes and Pharisees for their hypocrisy and warns against the dangers of pride. He teaches us the importance of humility and true greatness in the eyes of God.

In the Gospel of Matthew (23:1-12), Jesus criticizes the scribes and Pharisees for not practicing what they preach. They burden others with heavy loads but do not help. Their actions are driven by a desire for recognition and honor, rather than genuine love for God and others.

Jesus reminds us that true greatness lies in humility. He says, "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, but whoever humbles himself will be exalted." (Matthew 23:12) We should not seek to elevate ourselves above others or seek praise for our actions. Instead, we should approach life with a humble heart, recognizing our dependence on God and our need for His grace.

The first reading from Malachi (1:14-2:2b, 8-10) also emphasizes the importance of humility. The priests are rebuked for their lack of reverence and devotion. They have become complacent in their duties and have allowed pride to cloud their judgment.

True greatness is not found in titles or outward appearances. It is found in the humble and sincere love we have for God and others. We must serve and uplift others, rather than seeking recognition for ourselves.

Let us reflect on our own lives and ask ourselves: Do we approach our faith with humility? Are we more concerned with serving others than with being seen as great in the eyes of the world?

Jesus calls us to examine our hearts and motives. He invites us to embrace humility and selfless service. When we humble ourselves, we open our hearts to God's grace and allow Him to work through us.

In a world that values power and self-promotion, let us take inspiration from the saints who lived lives of humility and service. They show us that true greatness is found in selflessness and putting the needs of others before our own.

May we always remember that true greatness is found in humble service and that those who humble themselves will be exalted by God. Let us pray for the grace to embrace humility in our lives and to follow the example of Jesus, who humbled Himself for our sake. Amen.
