

For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

3rd Sunday of Advent (B) Is 61:1-2, 10-11; 1 Thes 5:16-24; Jn 1:6-8, 19-28

The Mass of the third Sunday of advent begins with this antiphon: *Gaudete in Domine semper!* (Rejoice in the Lord always!). Traditionally, we call this day "*Gaudete Sunday*" or "*Sunday of Rejoicing*" in order to encourage people to remain enthusiastic

in waiting for the Lord's coming.

During advent, the priest wears purple or violet vestments to signify that this is a time for repentance. Yet, during the third Sunday of advent, the priest uses "rose vestments" in order to show that in their sorrow and regret, penitents remain peaceful and hopeful because the time of salvation is very near. The first reading tells us that we are to rejoice because the Messiah will come to set us free from all bondages, physical and spiritual.

The gospel presents to us John the Baptist who bears witness to Jesus, the light of the world. The coming of the Lord calls for joy because he will remove darkness from the

world and will enlighten those who chose to follow Him.

As Christmas draws near, the Church calls us to become like John and to bear witness to Jesus, the light of the world. Let us reflect his light in our lives so that we may illuminate the lives of people around us. How are we going to do this? Saint Paul, in the second reading, has some proposals: *Rejoice always.*"

We can attract people to Christ only if they see us rejoicing. But what does this mean? Does God expect us to be happy all the time? What if we do not feel happy or merry? What if, we feel overwhelmed by the hardships, problems and tragedies in life? How

can we become happy (and celebrate Christmas)?

Oftentimes, we associate happiness with things or external circumstance: like material abundance, passing the board exams; successes in business, promotions in jobs, etc. It is true that Christmas carols, for many of us, bring joy and inspiration — lifting up our souls. Reunions or gatherings, Christmas parties, exchanging of gifts, bring about joys in our life. Even those who are non-believers of Christmas (because, according to them, this cannot be found in the Bible), also experience JOY provoked by this Christmas season. All these really affect our feelings. But sad to note that as our feelings go, so goes our ability to experience Christmas. As it were, if these things are already gone or spent, the feeling of joy is also gone.

However, in the Christian perspective, to rejoice is not only a matter of feeling but a decision. It is a decision to rejoice because we have with us the greatest JOY: not only the source of JOY, but the JOY himself, Jesus Christ. In Jesus, we find JOY, because He is God's Messiah, sent to bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim

liberty to the captives and release to prisoners.

We have to rejoice because Jesus, who is the LIGHT as John proclaims, in the gospel can truly help us in finding our way through the hard times and in facing or confronting the

dark nights and difficult days

Our joy, then, is a product of a peaceful heart, not of material possessions and worldly honors. Genuine Christians remain positive and hopeful even in the face of trials and difficulties because they are confident in God's help and protection. Despite the suffering and sadness we encounter each day, we are assured that God is with us in our humanity. Our God, in Jesus, has chosen to live our fragile humanity – assuring us that God cares for us.
